#### The Pastor's Corner

A professor in a philosophy class drove home a point on with the following illustration: he lifted a one-gallon, widemouthed Mason jar and set it on a table in front of him. He then placed, one at a time, 12 fist-sized rocks into the jar. When no more rocks would fit, he asked the audience if they believed the jar to be full. They said that they did, and he then reached under the table and produced a bucket of gravel. He scooped it into the jar and then shook it, thus causing the gravel to fill the spots between the rocks. He asked the same question again and this time, there were mixed replies. He took another box out from under that table and it was filled with sand. Dumping it in, it filled the gaps between the gravel and rocks. He asked the same question for a third time, and no one said anything. He then pulled out from under the table a pitcher of water and began pouring it in until the jar was filled to the brim. He then stated that the point of this illustration: "If you don't put the big rocks in first, you will never get them in at all. Do you know what the 'big rocks' in your life are?"

What are our priorities? It is the question being asked by this professor to these students, and it is a wonderful question for us to ask ourselves as often as we can. There are so many things that demand our attention in this rushed and busy life that if we make the wrong decisions on our priorities, then that which is truly important begins to lose focus in our lives.

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As I ponder the upcoming Lenten season, I have asked myself, "Where do my faith priorities lie?" The whole Lenten journey points to the cross and the ultimate victory of Jesus over death. In that victory, we receive life, salvation, and the reality of the Holy Spirit dwelling within. If we focus on that, we are able to then tap into a sense of peace, strength, and inner joy that helps us to prioritize the things in our life that truly matter: faith, family, our community of faith, and how these things then influence every other area of our lives.

The miracles, the teachings, and the truths that Jesus laid before his followers throughout his ministry were defined, and he was asking them to commit to him as Messiah. The reality was that for most of them, this teaching was too hard. Whether it was risking religious standing for the Sadducees, social status for the Pharisees, or economic security and sure banishment for anyone committing heresy, people then and now often deem a number of other things as more important than God, while seeking temporal security in their lives.

The reality, however, is that our commitment to faith needs to be the number one "big" rock in our jar. When it is, our lives take on a depth and a meaning that all the other priorities in our lives just can't provide. In fact, our other priorities become easier to manage when we lay everything at the foot of the cross. It is the promise of a God who loves us.



Each month, Bethel Deacons have been honoring a member of the church to help us get to know one another better. This month, we recognize Heather Kirkwood Yeung. Heather is part of a long lineage of Kirkwood members of Bethel. Her ancestors helped to build the original church, call its first pastor, and are memorialized in the graveyard and on some of the stained glass windows in the sanctuary. Heather was lucky to grow up on the historic family farm off of Harford Creamery and Bradenbaugh Roads. Some of her earliest memories are of singing in the Bethel children's choir and Sunday School picnics enjoying those little tubs of ice cream that came with a scratchy wooden spoon. As she grew, Heather participated in the bell choir, Sunday School (she still has all of her Sunday School pins!), youth group, confirmation class, and would play the piano at Sunday services from time to time.

After graduating from North Harford High School, Heather attended Western Maryland College. There, she had the opportunity to spend a semester abroad in Havana, Cuba, and graduated cum laude with two majors (Political Science and Music) and two minors (Spanish and Cross-Cultural Studies). After college, Heather moved to Austin, Texas for graduate school. During her time at the University of Texas, she had the opportunity to spend a semester abroad in San Jose, Costa Rica. After two years, she graduated with a Masters degree in Latin American Studies. She promptly purchased a one-way ticket to Buenos Aires, Argentina where she remained for nine months. In Argentina, Heather improved her Spanish, took Portuguese lessons, and learned to dance the tango. One of the highlights of her time there was a one-week visit from Norma Kirkwood and Leonora Rose. Of course, a proper presentation about the trip was made to the Schooner Club upon Heather's return.

Upon returning to the United States, Heather began law school at the University of Maryland in Baltimore. There, she focused on international law and had the opportunity to spend a semester in Zacatecas, Mexico. Upon graduation, Heather moved back to Harford County and worked for one year as a law clerk to Judge Carr and Judge Baldwin (a Bethel member!) at the Circuit Court of Harford County. After her one-year position ended, she moved to Washington, D.C. to be closer to her law school boyfriend Dillon Yeung and took a job at a Montgomery County law firm. At that firm she assisted Spanish-speaking immigrants with personal injury claims.
