# The Pastor's Corner

When the giant anxieties of life intersect our path, it is easy for us to be overcome by fear and anxiety. Fear can have a paralyzing affect on people. We live in tenuous times. As we emerge from a very difficult year and a half, it is hard not to be scared or worried. It is hard not to let go of our anxiety and to move forward in a strange new normal: to start stepping out into places and activities that we spent so many months avoiding.

It is more comfortable to stay in the reality of what we have come to know. The truth is, there is wisdom in caution. Finding safety and security in a new normal is difficult. But find it we must. The hope and security we seek is present in the body of Christ. The strength we seek is available to us because his love is more powerful that the strongest fear that could ever be thrown against it. Take comfort from these words from the book of Romans, "35 Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? 36 As it is written, "For your sake we are being killed all day long; we are accounted as sheep to be slaughtered." 37 No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. 38 For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, 39 nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord."

As we continue pray for our country and the tensions that come to us from so many angles during this difficult time, we can take heart that there is nothing that can separate us from the love of God In Christ Jesus. We need look no farther than the living word of God for examples of persevering in the midst of fear, turmoil, and hardship.

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Paul writes in the eighth chapter of Romans of about pursuing the call and living the faith even in the midst of fear when he says, "for your sake, we are being killed all day long. We are accounted as sheep to be slaughtered." In other words he is telling God's people that it's scary out here. We don't know from day to day what our fate will be. But we continue on.

In the midst of fear, these early Christians pressed on. They continued to work, they continued to raise their children, they continued to play, they continued to worship. Why? They were the people of the way. They were the light of the world. They had a call to discipleship even in the midst of the tenuous times in which they lived.

The truth of the matter is, as they were, we are. We, too, are the people of Christ, and our call to the faith is in no way different from theirs. We are called to overcome fear. We are called to fight the good fight, keep the faith, and finish the race, and with the assurance of his presence we will continue to live as a people of hope, a people with a mission: the people of Christ.

I encourage you, as things begin to open up this summer and it becomes safer to do activities you enjoyed but have avoided, step out into this new normal one step at a time as you turn to God and find the "Peace that passes all understanding." As we once again gather to work, play, worship, and enjoy fellowship, by the grace of God he will give us strength, courage and the faith to support one another, our friends and our families as we begin to move ahead!

Through lives lived in faith we will minister, showing to the world that indeed, despite the best efforts of evil to extinguish it, the light of the world will not go out and that ultimately, as the Bible promises, peace and love will emerge victorious! I wish you a blessed and wonderful Summer!!

To start off, here are 2 ways to use those wonderful home-grown tomatoes!!

# Greek Stuffed Tomatoes Lynda McRee

2 T olive oil

1 onion diced

2 C cooked spinach

2 t dried basil (or chopped fresh basil)

½ C breadcrumbs

1 egg

½ lb feta cheese crumbled

Salt & pepper to taste

6 tomatoes with insides scooped out

Preheat oven to 350. Lightly oil baking dish. In small saucepan heat oil and sauté onion 5 minutes or until translucent. Remove from heat. Combine remaining ingredients (except tomatoes) and add to onion. Stuff filling into tomatoes. Place in baking dish.

Bake 15-20 min. Serve warm.

# Tomato Pie Lynda McRee

Preheat oven: 350

Prebake 9" pie shell

½ cup chopped red or yellow onion

4-5 tomatoes – chopped and drained (remove as much juice as possible)

1/4 cup fresh basil - chopped

2 C shredded cheese – cheddar, mozzarella,

Gruyere, Monterey Jack or your favorite

½ C mayonnaise

Parmesan cheese

Layer pie shell: Onion, tomatoes, basil salt & pepper to taste

Combine the cheese with the mayonnaise. Spread on top of tomatoes. Sprinkle with parmesan cheese.

Bake 30 minutes or until lightly brown and bubbly.
